From the President

2022 saw BANSW and our member bands return to live performances and in-venue events.

This came as a great relief for all of us but was not without its challenges with a great deal of reluctance on the part of local councils to allow performances during the first half of the year and with a number of bands starting the year still locked out of their rehearsal spaces.

Fortunately by mid year almost all of these challenges had been overcome with a relaxation of all restrictions surrounding Covid and a return to "Normal" operations.

2022 saw us with an extremely busy year as we remembered:

- "How to do" in-venue events as we prepared for the oncoming 2023 Australian National Band Championships,
- Sorted through the mess of refunds and prepayments from cancelled events and 2020 membership fee reductions which had actually created a significant problem for us to work through,
- Working through the held over grants projects for bands as well as getting our regular program back on track.

Planning for the 2023 Australian National Band Championships continued, however, there were still issues with the relationship between BANSW and our decision not to be a part of the subsequently cancelled 2022 satellite Nationals.

From the President....

Paul DeCinque left the Council in July 2022 leaving the NBCA without a President for several months, and leaving us without a CLO for the 2023 Nationals. Adrian Loone was subsequently appointed to this role by the Council and a new President was elected. Unfortunately, there was subsequently no contact with us made by the new President of the Council until well into 2023.

The relationship between BANSW and the NBCA continues to remain challenging.

The BANSW new Strategic Plan has been postponed for completion until later in 2023, as has the implementation of a range of advisory policy documents which will assist bands in a number of important policy areas.

Our membership is strong and entries at the 2022 State Band Championships were high. The Association has made a financial loss for 2022, this is mainly attributed to:

- Increased costs and lower entries at the State Solos,
- Increased costs for the Band Championships mainly from increased allowance for time between bands due to Covid,
- A continued reduction in our membership fees to provide that important financial assistance to Bands as they recover from Covid and get their own programs re-established.



From the President...

2023 should see our membership fees returning to the pre-covid level and we expect that Association activities will return to our pre-covid levels. We look forward to a return to the focus of working for BANSW without the additional work of the National Band Championships and the NBCA, which has been a constant part of our workloads since 2019.

I thank all the members of the Management Committee and our wonderful support team for their hard work, support and friendship throughout the year, particularly through the difficulties which we have faced and the decisions we have had to make. The last couple of years were difficult, but in many ways, 2022 was even more difficult and I am in awe of the way in which we have been able to pull together and achieve the things that we have achieved.

I thank you all for your continued support throughout this most difficult of years. It has again been both an honour and privilege to serve you all in the position of President of this great community.

Secretary/ Administration

As mentioned in the President's report, 2022 was challenging in many ways, just as it has been in previous years, and I again offer my thanks to the Management Committee for their assistance.

Email correspondence continues to make up the largest portion of my role as Secretary, and it has often been a struggle to keep on top of as I have struggled to balance work/family and Association commitments. Contests

We were extremely happy to see both the Solos and Band Championships operate in venue in 2022. We were a little rusty at both events after being online or not having the events at all for the last few years. I'd like to congratulate all soloists and bands for their time and effort into making these events the success that they were in 2022.

We would like to offer our thanks to those who signed up as volunteers for all of our events. Your willingness to help us run these events is much appreciated.

State Band Championships – The Joan Sutherland Performing Arts Centre, August 27/28, 2022

The 2021 Band Championships that were re-scheduled to March 2022 ultimately did not go ahead.

The 2022 Band Championships went ahead at the normal time in August. We had 54 bands compete, which was a much higher number than we expected with it being the first event back in-venue. Our adjudicators for the weekend were Simon Reade (TAS) and Peter Walmsley (NSW). YouTube states - Appendix K

State Solo & Party Championships – Barker College, Hornsby June 25/26, 2022

Numbers were still smaller than expected in the first in-venue Solos contest in a number of years. Approx. 240 entries were received. All events were elected to be own choice rather than test selections.

2022 saw the use of a new system that Ian Madden setup where most elements of the contest was conducted via electronic means. All registration desks, room supervisors and adjudicators were provided with tablets to manage each section of the contest.

Contests...

The great thing about this was that adjudicators/recorders could input the results of each event, the contest office would be notified and could prepare and produce certificates more efficiently. This was a great saver on the day and the contest office/registrars could monitor where each room was up to. This system will evolve over the next couple of years as we become more familiar with it and work any bugs. This should allow us to work on easier ways to manage on less numbers of volunteers and less paper.

Australian National Online Festival of Bands (ANOFOB) - November 12, 2022

Unfortunately, only a small number of bands entered the event. The synchronisation licences have played a big part in the numbers. In 2023, we will try running the event again but using the YouTube policies and removing a big barrier for bands. I give thanks to Joan Thorp for providing feedback to the bands on their performances and to Tim Kelly at Brassbanned for streaming the bands.

Registrar/Recorder/Technology

2022 saw the introduction of online member vouchers. Band Secretaries can generate the voucher which automatically sends an email to the proposed new member for approval. Approval from the player is granted by sending an email to the Registrar. It was originally envisaged that the member would click on a link to approve the registration but that is no longer an option. We are not really comfortable asking people to click on a link which may be unknown to the recipient.

The greatest benefit for online vouchers is that we can email back the player if we suspect that they may already be in the database but with a slight difference in DOB or spelling of the name. Once we are happy with that, the email address and DOB are deleted from the small cloud database table.

The voucher collects the players email address rather than the Street address noting that the email address and date of birth are deleted from our online database once the players has acknowledged the registration request.

Note: Paper vouchers or facsimiles thereof are still accepted however restricted access to the Associations PO Box makes the posting of paper vouchers very cumbersome.

NBCA

I attended all meetings held in the past year by NBCA via Zoom link. The June conference was held in Newcastle so I attended that in person.

Throughout the year, there has been much discussion on issues including:

Nationals: Especially the in-venue/online 2022 event which was promoted against BANSW advice and then subsequently cancelled, the Parade of Bands, the appointment of Adrian Loone as Contest Liaison Officer, special considerations for the 2023 event if Covid issues arose.

Finances: Access to and payment of outstanding returns. New Executive Officer has had difficulties with access and operating accounts following the passing of the previous EO.

Yearbook/Contest Rules: The NBCA completely redrafted the Contest Regulations with the intention of creating a book or regulations for participation at Nationals and one for Organisation and management of a Nationals for the Organising Committees. The first was implemented and the second has never been completed. The 2023 Nationals is subsequently being run on a very slimmed down version of the Contest Regulations with minimal organisational rules in place.

Marches and Music Selection: There is now a new advisory committee.

Women in Brass.

Welcome to Country/Acknowledgement at events and meetings: Paul de Cinque presented one for use at the National conference.

New Chairperson appointed: New EO is Megan Stapleton, New councillor for Victoria, changing ones for SA.

Paul de Cinque resigned after the AGM and an election process was put in place with a special meeting held to appoint a new interim President. Brian Dodds was appointed.

Participation in the Parade of Bands was made optional for all bands from 2024 onwards.

It's been a difficult year for NBCA and challenging for delegates working within the changing group.

Commencing as Chair of the NSW Band Association Music Advisory Board (MAB) on the 8th February 2022, it has been a privilege to work together with wonderful colleagues including Brian McGuinness, Michael Forsyth, Garry Clark, Andrew McWade, Fiona Lucas, Brenden Millard and David Kimpton (joining in June).

2022 was an exceptionally busy and innovative year for our team. Harnessing the responsibility of both our 2022 NSW State Band Championship Test Piece Selections together with 2023 Australian National Band and Solo Championships Test Piece Music Selections was indeed significant

Further to this, our MAB Team embraced the opportunity to 'increase' the number of Test Piece works on offer for our Brass & Wind Bands.

Having made headway on this objective during the previous year, our MAB successfully provided a comprehensive list of in-excess of 130 works for Wind and Brass Bands, providing a highly diverse and varied selection of works on a magnitude unseen on previous Band Association Australian Test Music lists, with each work carefully selected on varied and aligned musical challenges, and merits within associated grades.

It was also our absolute objective to further address and 'pioneer' all areas of diversity, in selecting music inclusive of:

- Musical representation inclusive of female & male composers
- Our intention to increasing the profile of Australian works on our 2022 NSW State Championship Test Piece List.
- 2022 NSW State Championship Test Piece List – To include familiar and new works.
- Economic responsibilities – Specially in the post-covid world, acknowledging that for many bands purchasing new and expensive pieces would be prohibitive.
- Select works that could be performed again in concerts etc...



Music Selection Committee...

Highlighting tremendous collaboration for our entire team, the presentation of the BANSW Test Pieces for 2022 was a representation of the enormous developments that we have made (and continue to make) in the provision of our BANSW Test Pieces for 2022 and long into the future.

The result of our work was released on the 1st April, attracting profoundly positive feedback and comment from musicians within NSW, throughout Australia and abroad.

Similarly, shortly following the submission of the 2022 NSW State Test Pieces, the MAB turned our attention to the 2023 Australian National Championships – Test Pieces for Brass & Concert Bands – Junior & Open Age Bands and Solos – Junior & Open for Woodwind, Brass and Percussion.

Following months of listening, research, discussion & collaboration on the 20th July, our Music Advisory Board (MAB) presented our FINAL 2023 Australian Nationals TEST PIECE LIST prepared with ALL available links, timings & publishers for the National Band Council of Australia (NBCA).

We are very proud of our efforts, our list represented an enormous amount of care, thought, reflection and responsibility from all MAB members for our Australian Banding movement.

Retaining our over- arching objectives for 2022, our 2023 Australian Nationals TEST PIECE LIST submission, demonstrated exceptional expansion in the breadth of composer diversity, representing an excellent balance of works featuring female/male composers, with loads of Australian works in there also!

In Conclusion:

We have exciting times ahead, and a great opportunity to shape the musical future of our bands as we continue to grow through our 'post covid' years. The challenges, as previously outlined, are to keep evolving our music selection lists, balancing the classics with the new, and encouraging our local NSW/ACT and other Australian composers to continue to write for our musicians, as we all grow and develop.

As highlighted through past years of Test Music selections, the BANSW Music Sub-Committee has been leading the way in the Australian Banding Community with our very clear focus on supporting Australian composers and encouraging and premiering new music for the past 12 - 13 years or so, and we have achieved great things. The challenge now is to stay at that leading edge and respond to the needs of our members and their communities.

Workshops.

The Skunkworks Online Master Class 2022 was held between 25th and 29th September 2022.

The number of participants who registered for the 24 online classes was 446 with a total of 1,035 class registrations (on average approximately 2.5 classes per participant). The classes were provided by a total of 21 clinicians, music educators and subject matter experts. The instrumental clinicians were musicians from the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra, Black Dyke Band, Cory Band, Fairey Band, and other international artists.

The 2022 Online Master Class Series was financially supported by a number of sponsors and therefore we were able to provide the classes to participants at no cost.

Project Goals

The goals of the MasterClass 2022 Series were to:

- Develop young musicians and community musicians to the highest level;
- Provide an environment where young musicians can achieve their full potential;
- Provide motivation and inspiration for all musicians to further develop their musical abilities;
- Promote awareness of the State Band Associations and community banding;
- Provide access to world class musicians for community musicians and students.

Program and Registrations

The Master Class 2022 Series provided a broad curriculum from specialist instrumental classes to performance preparation, building a practice routine through to music licensing and child safety policies for community organisations.

Marketing

The Master Class Series was marketed on social media and the Skunkworks website as well as the state band associations websites. A number of short videos by a number of the master class clinicians were produced and also posted on social media and YouTube.

The interest generated in the Master Class series by this marketing campaign was outstanding and achieved more registrations than expected.

Grants.

Community Band Development Grant Program (CBDG Program)

2020 Program: Almost all of the grants approved for the 2020 and 2021 programs were held over to be spent in 2022 due to Covid 19 difficulties.

Acquittals for these are due in early 2023.

The 2022 CBDG program, once launched, saw 20 applications totalling \$39,160 for a range of projects. We were pleased to have approved all applications with amounts allocated to reflect the available funding pool of \$27,000.

We thank our colleagues at CreateNSW and the NSW Minister for the Arts for their ongoing support.

Band Public Liability Insurance

Scheme

The Public Liability Insurance scheme continues to be popular with bands with 38 bands being a part of this scheme.

This has become an important product offering of the Association, being a key reason for a with a number of bands continuing to retain their membership.

OneMusic Australia Licence

There were 48 bands registered for the licence in 2022

OneMusic Australia has been worked on updating their normal licences over the past couple of years to the point that the normal Community Groups licence is nearly the same as what we have but we have a 10% discount for cost of our licence.

Music Library and Archive

There has been a noticeable increase in borrowing this year, probably due to bands resuming activity after the covid lockdowns.

Cataloguing of scores is complete but there have been a number of band CDs donated recently which will be added to the data base in the coming months.

There are still some 100 sets of brass band march cards which have not been located. This is of great concern as many of these sets are rare. I would like to produce conductor scores and A4 sets for some of them, especially those by Australian composers.

We now have about 5000 items available for loan.

Hunter Regional Band Association

Following on from a difficult year in 2021, 2022 was a more fruitful year for the HRBA. We were able to successfully run both of our normal major events: The East Coast Band Championship/Festival of the Bands and the HRBA's Solo and Party Competition as live events. This year the East Coast Championships, held on 18 June 2022 at the Hunter School of Performing Arts, attracted ten bands from A to D Grades from Newcastle, the Central Coast and Sydney. Also taking part were two school bands and one training band with the event also being live streamed. We also offer our thanks to the Newcastle PCYC Band, under the direction of Teena Wallace, who once again managed the staging of the event. Thanks also to Adjudicator Fiona Lucas, Contest Supervisor Justin Screen and our various sponsors.

Our Solo and Party Competition was equally as successful due to strong interest from bands from outside of the Hunter and Central Coast. It was pleasing to see so many young performers entering this year's event, which necessitated the running of a number of Under 10 and Under 13 events, as well as novice and restricted categories. Under 16, 19 and open categories were also keenly contested with enough entrants to justify the use of two halls. Adjudicators, Patrick Brennan and Fiona Watson, spoke highly of the performances which would not have been what they were but for the efforts of accompanists Philip Sketchley and Chris Vidler. Thanks also to the Toronto and District Brass Band for their work in stage managing the event.

HRBA was also able to successfully run two Bands in the Park events, in May and September, at Lake Macquarie Councils Multi-Arts Pavilion (MIMA) at Speer's Point featuring bands from both Newcastle and the Central Coast. We are also looking forward to presenting three Bands in the Park concerts in the upcoming year thanks to funding from the City of Lake Macquarie.

As in previous years, I would like to offer my appreciation and thanks to the Band Association of New South Wales for their continuing support of both our Association, and our member bands as brokers of the New South Wales Government's Create NSW grant scheme. This scheme has helped keep bands financially viable, and to stage concerts when restrictions have allowed. I also acknowledge the various people who have been tirelessly preparing grant applications to access this scheme, your work is very much appreciated by all.

In conclusion, I would like to offer my personal thanks to the HRBA's committee members who have been patiently keeping things ticking along while we have been in suspended animation. Special thanks to Secretary Kylie-Ann Lysaght and Vice President John Kellaway for keeping me on track. Thanks also to Treasurer Paul Mather for looking after our finances and to committee members Sven Wright and Darren Nichols, the ever-present Doug Treloar, and Linden Wright for her assistance with the East Coast Contest. Welcome also to new committee members Greg Brennan, Rob Muir and Janelle Carter who have provided valuable input during their tenure.


